What is EIIHA?

- Early Identification of Individuals living with HIV/AIDS
- A strategy introduced by HRSA in September 2009
- Its purpose is to ensure all people know their status, whether it's positive or negative
- It also outlines the need to develop a strategy to bring people with HIV into care



EIIHA Strategy

The four components:

1. Testing:

Traditional and rapid testing

2. Counseling:

Pre and post counseling, regardless of test result

3. Referrals:

 Referring individuals to appropriate services and verifying that services were accessed

4. Linkage:

Linking individuals to medical care





EIIHA vs Unmet Need


- EIIHA: A person with HIV who is <u>UNAWARE</u> of their status and not in primary medical care.
- Unaware of HIV Status: Any person who has <u>NOT</u> been tested for HIV in the past 12-months.
- Unmet Need: A person with HIV who is <u>AWARE</u> of their status but not in primary medical care.






Knowing your HIV Status

- The most important piece to the EIIHA puzzle is increasing the number of people being tested at least once every 12 months
- Two-fold outcome from this component:
 - 1. Increase the number of people who know their status
 - 2. Increase the number of people with HIV in care





Total Tested in Orlando Service Area


Publicly funded testing events 2019-2023

^{*}Referrals to prevention services can include things like PrEP, behavioral interventions, risk reduction counseling services, and medical services. If a newly diagnosed or previously diagnosed client went to a private provider for linkage and services, it might not get noted in the HIV Counseling & Testing system.










Populations of Focus, Orlando Service Area Publicly funded testing events in 2023

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
